**World famous political personalities**

- Sarojini Naidu-the Nightingale of India

She is the first Indian woman to become the President of the Indian National Congress. She is a great patriot, an efficient politician, a good orator and a wonderful administrator. She is one of the top world famous personalities of the 20th century. She played an important role in re-establishing self-esteem in Indian women.

- Indira Gandhi - the Woman of the Millennium

She entered politics at a very young age and become the first women Prime Minister of India. She is the second longest serving Prime Minister of India who served the country for a long period. She was the strongest Prime Minister of India with great administrative power and political foresight.

- Sonia Gandhi

She is the highly influential person of the United Progressive Alliance (UPA) and was the Chairperson of the UPA government in India. She became the longest serving President of the Congress Party.

- Sprint Queen P.T.Usha

Payyoli Tevaraparampil Usha popularly known as P.T.Usha was one of the best women athletes of India. She remained as the queen of track events for nearly two decades which include 13 gold medals in the Asian Games. She is the recipient of the prestigious Arjuna Award in the year 1984 which is given by the Govt of India.

She is yet another famous sportsperson who brought international fame to India. She represented the country in the South Asian Federation Games held in 1984, 1986 and 1988 in which she received 2 silver in Nepal, 2 silver medals in Bangladesh and 3 gold medals in Pakistan respectively.

She is a professional tennis player from India who brought much name and fame to the country through her powerful forehand ground strokes. Presently she is ranked as No.1 tennis player in singles as well as doubles. Her greatest achievement in her tennis career was winning the mixed doubles crown in the 2009 Australian Open tennis tournament. She made India proud by her wonderful achievement in the field of her choice.

- Saina Nehawal

She is the country's greatest women badminton player who created a history by being ranked No.2 in the world level in 2010. Currently, she is ranked world's No.1 badminton player by Badminton World Federation. - **IromChanuSharmila**

Also called the Iron Lady of Manipur, she holds the record for the longest hunger strike. The activist has been sitting on a strike for over a decade, demanding the repeal of the Armed Forces Special Powers Act (AFSPA).

- **ChhaviRajawat**

Rajawat is the first woman sarpanch in India with an MBA degree. She ditched a well-paying corporate job with one of India's biggest telecom firms to become the sarpanch of Soda, a village 60 kms from Jaipur. She has tirelessly been working for the people of the village and has successfully implemented many projects including rain water harvesting, toilets facilities etc.

- **Amrita Devi**

Way back in 1730, when Indian women had little say even in matters at home, this brave woman fought against the felling of tress by the Maharaja of Jodhpur in Marwar, Rajasthan, by sacrificing her life, along with those of her three daughters.

- **Phoolan Devi**

Phoolan Devi was a bandit who later went on to become a politician. She was popularly known as the Bandit Queen and became the moll of a gang leader of a group of bandits at a young age.

- **SitaSahu**

Sprinter SitaSahu won 2 bronze medals at the 2011 Special Olympics in Athens at the young age of 15. Unfortunately, due to the ignorance and lack of concern from authorities, the girl now sells golgappe in DhobiyaTanke in Rewa, Madhya Pradesh.

- **ChandaKochhar**

Kochhar, ICICI Bank CEO, recently made it to the Fortune list of 25 most powerful women in the Asia-Pacific region, and stands first among other Indian women. She has been featured in this list consistently since 2005. She has also been honoured with the Padma Bhushan Award in 2010, the third highest civilian honour by the Indian government, for her services to the banking sector.

- **Sapper Shanti Tigga**

35-year-old Tigga became the first Indian woman, who is a mother of two, to become a jawan in the Indian Army. Standing at par with her male counterparts, she joined the 969 RailwayEngineer Regiment of Territorial Army in 2011. However, her life ended too soon as she was abducted and later found dead.

- **Asha Roy**

The daughter of a vegetable seller is currently the fastest Indian on the track, setting a record at the National Open Athletics Championship in Kolkata in 2011.

- **KalpanaChawla**

Chawla was the first Indian woman to go to space. She passed away in the infamous Columbia disaster in 2003 when the space shuttle disintegrated over Texas while re-entering the earth's atmosphere hours before it was scheduled to conclude its 28th mission.

- **ReenaKaushalDharmshaktu**

Skiing through the deserted and coldest regions in the world, mountaineer and Delhi-based outdoor instructor Reena, along with seven other women, became the first woman to reach the southernmost tip of the world, the South Pole, all in 38 days.

- **Durga Shakti Nagpal**

An IAS officer in the UP cadre, Nagpal is posted as the joint magistrate of Kanpur. She came into public view when she launched an aggressive anti-corruption campaign in GautamBudh Nagar.

- **Kunjarani Devi**

The bespectacled 46-year-old is perhaps the most celebrated Indian woman in weightlifting. She was also the first woman to win the Arjuna award in 1990. She also shared the Rajiv Gandhi KhelRatna award with Leander Paes in 1996-1997.

- **IndraNooyi**

Indra Krishnamurthy Nooyi is the chairperson and CEO of the second largest food and beverage business in the world, Pepsi Co. Nooyi has been a regular in the world's most powerful women's lists. She was also named as the third most powerful women in business by Fortune in 2014.
